You are most cordially invited to the Society's Annual Meeting in The Mansion at Rosecliff, on the site of the former Harden Estate, The Wilderness, which is just off Long Hill Road West.

The Mansion at Rosecliff: this historic, stately Italianate mansion built by Edward Harden in the 1920's -- our Annual Meeting site -- has a courtyard paved with Belgian cobblestones

The meeting will include:

- **Review of the past year,** including results of our Member Survey, with a few interesting surprises
- **Status of the Society's new home** in the Briarcliff Library

- Brief profile of The Wilderness and Rosecliff and the interesting role this property has played in our Village history
- Visual presentation of "Touring Westchester: Historic Treasures In Our Own Backyard", by Katie Hite, Executive Director of the Westchester

County Historical Society. These attractions have been gleaned from "Picturing Our Past", a full-color, hard-cover volume recently published by the WCHS, featuring county sites on the National Register. This

presentation will probably turn you into a local traveler very soon.

• **Refreshments** and the fun of mixing with friends and neighbors in a very special place.

Edward Walker Harden was a major newspaper editor, member of the NYSE and friend of Frank Vanderlip. He bought several acres between Sleepy Hollow and Long Hill Roads in the 1920s and later bought the neighboring Brandywine estate. Our ornate meeting site was his home during his later life, and evidence of his intriguing personal touches remains. The Mansion's use is strictly limited to Rosecliff residents. We are most fortunate to be allowed access for our meeting.

Our speaker, **Katie Hite**, originally from Wisconsin, has been with the

WCHS for 15 years, has lived in Westchester for 42 years and really knows local history. She received



To report on 2010 projects, last year's letter mentioned the first Houses of Worship Tour in February and the amazing March 21st housewarming & dedication of our new home on the lower level of the expanded Briarcliff Library. More than 200 Society members and friends gathered to see what their generous donations had made possible, and they were as excited as our Officers and Board were about the wonderful result. We're still filing, cataloging and archiving – and we'll be open soon!

In other news, the 2010 Annual Meeting at The Great Hall at Edith Macy Conference Center in April was like meeting in a National Park Lodge. There were two fireplaces, lots of stone and wood, a terrific presentation by Scott Craven on local historic surprises, and by Dave Vogt, the center's General Manager, on Edith Macy's unique role in the community. All that, plus good food, drink and conversation, made all 80-plus of us feel most fortunate to have such a world-class his-

toric attraction in our midst.

In May, we participated in the second "Arts Abloom" day at the Library, sponsored by BriCA, and early in June we awarded the Eileen Weber Scholarship at Briarcliff High School. The bus went out full – all 34 seats – and provided a comfortable, interesting ride, with good weather and sparkling commentary by our leader, Betsy O'Leary, and her compatriot, Eileen Weber. The tour came back to a truly epicurean reception at Betsy and John O'Leary's home. What a great day!!
